Determiners

When you want to say how many things or people something is true for, you can use words like *all the, most* and *both*.

All the goes before a plural count noun or a noncount noun. It shows that something is true for every thing or person in a group, e.g. a class, a country, a group of objects.

Most goes before a plural count noun or a noncount noun. It shows that something is true for nearly all (but not all) the things or people in a group.

Both goes before a plural count noun (e.g. *both my parents*). You can also use it with a singular count noun in this way: *both* + singular noun + *and* + another singular noun (e.g. *both my mom and dad*). It shows that something is true for two things or people.
