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- 10.1 ride** (n) /raɪd/
a trip by bicycle, motorbike or on a horse
• *Did you enjoy your ride along the cycle path by the sea?* > ride (v), rider (adj)
❖ promenade
- 10.2 Ecuador** (n) /'ekwədɔː(r)/
a country in South America > Ecuadorian (adj, n) ❖ Équateur
- 10.3 green** (adj) /griːn/
not bad for the environment; related to helping the environment • *If people use cars less, it could make our cities greener.* ❖ écologique
- 10.4 traffic** (n) /'træfɪk/
all the cars, buses, lorries, etc. on a street at the same time • *The bus was late because there was so much traffic.*
❖ trafic
- 10.5 polluted** (adj) /pə'ljuːtɪd/
dirty and not safe to use • *You can't drink the water from the river because it is polluted.*
> pollute (v), pollution (n) ❖ pollu(e)
- 10.6 pavement** (n) /'peɪvmənt/
a path where people can safely walk, next to a road • *There's a new pavement in our street now, so we don't have to walk on the road.*
> pave (v) ❖ trottoir
- 10.7 narrow** (adj) /'nærəʊ/
having a short distance between one side and the other • *The bridge is too narrow for two cars to cross at the same time, so there are traffic lights at both ends.* > narrow (v)
❖ étroit(e)
- 10.8 public transport** (n) /'pʌblɪk 'trænsɜːt/
all the ways for people to travel that the government provides in a country/city, e.g. bus, metro • *It's cheap to use public transport in my town, but you have to wait a long time for a bus.* ❖ transport public (transport en commun)
- 10.9 system** (n) /'sɪstəm/
a set of things that are organised to work together • *People could stop driving in the city if we had a better public transport system.*
❖ système

- 10.10 subway station** (n) /'sʌbweɪ 'steɪʃn/
a place where people get on and off an underground train • *Which subway station is nearest to the city centre?* ❖ station de métro
📌 Syn: underground station
- 10.11 connection** (n) /kə'nekʃn/
a link; sth that joins two or more things
• *I hope our flight to Frankfurt is on time so we don't miss our connection to New York.*
> connect (v) ❖ correspondance
- 10.12 service** (n) /'sɜːvɪs/
sth helpful for sb to use • *You don't have to drive because there's a regular bus service between here and the subway station.*
> serve (v), services (n pl), servant (n)
❖ service
- 10.13 square** (n) /skweə(r)/
an open, usually square-shaped, area of land with buildings around it • *We had lunch at a local café in the village square.* > square (adj)
❖ place
- 10.14 cycle path** (n) /'saɪkl pɑːθ/
a special road, or part of a street, where people can ride bicycles • *Cars are not allowed to go on the cycle paths, so it's safe to ride your bike there.* ❖ piste cyclable
- 10.15 scheme** (n) /skiːm/
a plan • *The government announced a new bicycle sharing scheme to encourage people to leave their cars at home.* > scheme (v)
❖ plan, projet
- 10.16 parking** (n, adj) /'pɑːkɪŋ/
leaving a vehicle in a place for a period of time
• *She doesn't drive her car to the city centre because there aren't many parking places there.* > park (v), parked (adj)
❖ parking
- 10.17 autumn** (n) /'ɔːtəm/
the time of year between summer and winter
• *In the UK, a lot of trees change their colours from green to brown and yellow in autumn.*
❖ automne 📌 US English: fall
- 10.18 trail** (n) /treɪl/
a path through the countryside • *There's a walking trail around the side of the lake.*
> trail (v) ❖ sentier 📌 Syn: path
- 10.19 connect** (v) /kə'nekt/
to join one thing to another • *A bridge connects the subway station with the parking area.* ❖ relier

- 10.20 air** (n) /eə(r)/
the space above the ground; the gases that are all around us • *The city air became cleaner after the metro opened.* > air (v)
❖ air
- 10.21 award** (n) /ə'wɔ:d/
a prize for doing sth special • *The town won an award for having the most green spaces in the country.* > award (v) ❖ récompense
- 10.22 importantly** (adv) /ɪm'pɔ:tntli/
used to say that your point is very important • *They were late home because of the storm. More importantly, they got back safely.* > important (adj) ❖ plus important
- 10.23 wide** (adj) /waɪd/
having a large distance from one side to the other, not narrow • *The river was 20 metres wide, but we crossed it.* > widen (v), width (n)
❖ large
- 10.24 park** (v) /pɑ:k/
to leave a vehicle in a place for a period of time • *The street was so busy that Dora couldn't find anywhere to park her car.* > park (n), parking (adj), parked (adj)
❖ garer
- 10.25 well-known** (adj) /,wel 'nəʊn/
that a lot of people know about • *Lewis Hamilton is a well-known racing driver.*
❖ célèbre

- 10.30 reporter** (n) /rɪ'pɔ:tə(r)/
a person whose job it is to report news for newspapers, TV, radio, etc. • *He works as a reporter for Channel 6 news.* > report (v, n)
❖ reporter 📁 Syn: journalist
- 10.31 passport** (n) /'pɑ:spɔ:t/
a small official book that shows who you are and where you come from when you travel to another country • *We must show our passports at the airport.* ❖ passeport
- 10.32 petrol** (n) /'petrəl/
oil used to make an engine work • *The driver stopped to put some petrol in his car.*
❖ essence 📁 US English: gasoline
- 10.33 driving licence** (n) /'draɪvɪŋ 'laɪsns/
a paper to show that sb has passed a driving test • *Alison took her test twice before she passed and got her driving licence.*
❖ permis de conduire
- 10.34 rarely** (adv) /'reəli/
not often; hardly ever • *Gregory rarely drives to work because it's cheaper to take the subway.* > rare (adj) ❖ rarement

a large bus • *You can take a coach trip to Olympia for a few days to see the ancient stadium.* ❖ autocar

Remember that in Unit 6 we saw the word *coach* used with the meaning of 'someone who teaches people a sport'. Here *coach* refers to a bus used to take people on trips.

a vehicle that runs on electricity to carry passengers on city streets • *The tram from the airport to the city centre is a bit slow.*
❖ tramway
- 10.28 rail** (n) /reɪl/
trains as a type of transport • *You can take the tram and then the subway to go right across the city by rail.* ❖ ferroviaire
- 10.29 report** (n) /rɪ'pɔ:t/
a description of sth that happened or is happening • *I heard the news report about the flight delays.* > report (v), reporter (n)
❖ rapport

- 10.35 delay** (v) /dɪ'leɪ/
to make sth happen later than planned • *The ship was delayed because of the stormy weather.* > delayed (adj), delay (n)
❖ retarder
- 10.36 petrol station** (n) /'petrəl 'steɪʃn/
a place where you stop to put petrol, etc. in a car • *They were lucky to find a petrol station open in a village after driving so many miles.*
❖ station service 📁 US English: gas station
- 10.37 depart** (v) /dɪ'pɑ:t/
to leave • *The train departs at nine and arrives in London at eleven.* > departure (n)
❖ partir
- 10.38 steal** (v) /sti:l/
take sth that belongs to sb else without permission • *Somebody stole Katya's bag when she was on the metro.* > stolen (adj), stealing (n) ❖ voler

- 10.39 ticket inspector** (n) /'tɪkɪt ɪn'spektər/
a person whose job is to check passengers' tickets on a bus, train, etc. • *The ticket inspector told two passengers to get off the bus because they didn't have tickets.*
❖ contrôleur
- 10.40 Thanksgiving** (n) /θæŋks'gɪvɪŋ/
an important holiday at the end of autumn in the USA and Canada • *Americans have a big family dinner for Thanksgiving at the end of November, but Canadians celebrate this in October.* ❖ Thanksgiving
- 10.41 sushi** (n) /'su:ʃi/
a kind of Japanese food with rice put in small shapes with uncooked fish, etc. • *Mark doesn't like fish, so he isn't coming to the sushi bar with us.* ❖ sushi

the part of a train station where you get on or off a train • *Which platform does the train to Edinburgh leave from?* ❖ quai

- 10.44 check in** (phr v) /tʃek ɪn/
to arrive at an airport and show your ticket to tell the person at a desk that you are there or to hand in your luggage; to arrive at a hotel and collect your key • *You'll have to check in at the airport two hours before the flight.*

- 10.45 full** (adj) /fʊl/
that has a lot of people or things • *The train is always full when people are going to work in the morning.* > fill (v) ❖ plein(e), complet/ complète
- 10.46 journey** (n) /'dʒɜ:nɪ/
an act of travelling from one place to another • *Yvonne sometimes feels sick when she goes on long bus journeys.* ❖ trajet, voyage
- 10.47 recommend** (v) /,rekə'mend/
tell sb that sth is good for sth • *The hotel was fantastic. I recommend it for families with young children.* > recommendation (n)
❖ recommander, conseiller

the act of leaving a place at a particular time • *All the flight departures from Boston were late because of bad weather.* > depart (v)
❖ (au) départ (de)

five minutes before a particular hour • *We got to the station at five to nine and got on the nine o'clock train.* ❖ moins cinq
- 10.50 services** (n pl) /'sɜ:vɪsɪz/
a place where you can stop for petrol, food, drinks and toilets next to a main road between towns • *We can stop for a snack at the services on the road to Delphi.* > serve (v), servant (n)
❖ station service
- 10.51 single (ticket)** (n) /'sɪŋgl ('tɪkɪt)/
a ticket for a one-way journey (to go somewhere and not come back on the same trip) • *I bought a single ticket for the bus to the airport.* ❖ aller simple
- 10.52 return (ticket)** (n) /rɪ'tɜ:n ('tɪkɪt)/
a ticket for a two-way journey (to go somewhere and come back) • *It's cheaper to buy a return ticket on the train than to pay for only one way.* > return (v) ❖ aller-retour
- 10.53 continent** (n) /'kɒntɪnənt/
one of the large masses of land on Earth, e.g. Europe or Asia • *Very few people live on the continent of Antarctica.* > continental (adj)
❖ continent
- 10.54 cause** (v) /kɔ:z/
to make sth happen • *Did you find out what caused the flight delay? Was it the weather?*
> cause (n) ❖ causer, provoquer

a pilot who helps another pilot to fly a plane • *When the pilot took a quick break, the co-pilot was in control of the plane.*

to go across from one side of sth to the other • *Be careful when you cross the road.*
> crossing (n) ❖ traverser

- 10.60** **get back** (phr v) /get bæk/
to return • *I'm shopping right now, but I'll call you when I get back home.* ❖ rentrer
- 10.61** **get off** (phr v) /get ɒf/
go out of a bus, train, plane or ship • *We got off the bus outside the school.* ❖ descendre
- 10.62** **get on** (phr v) /get ɒn/
to go into a bus, train, plane or ship
• *Sue got on the plane at Heathrow airport.*
❖ monter (dans/à bord)
- 10.63** **pick sb up** (phr v) /pɪk 'sʌmbədi ʌp/
collect sb (e.g. to take them with you in your car) • *The taxi will be here to pick us up in half an hour.* ❖ récupérer quelqu'un

- 10.72** **purse** (n) /pɜːs/
a small bag for carrying money • *She took some cash out of her purse to buy bus tickets.*
❖ porte-monnaie
- 10.73** **backpack** (n) /'bækpæk/
a large bag that you can carry on your back
• *The campers were carrying large backpacks with their tents and clothes.* ❖ sac à dos
- 10.74** **wake up** (phr v) /weɪk ʌp/
to stop sleeping • *What time do you usually wake up in the morning?* ❖ se réveiller
- 10.75** **disappointed** (adj) /,dɪsə'pɔɪntɪd/
unhappy when sth doesn't go as well as you wanted it to or when sth doesn't happen
• *We felt disappointed that we had to cancel our holiday.* > disappoint (v), disappointing (adj), disappointment (n) ❖ déçu(e)
