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8.1 free runner (n) /fri: 'rʌnə(r)/
sb who does a sport that involves running and jumping in the streets • *Free runners have lots of fun, but they can easily fall and get hurt doing their sport.* ❖ free runner (coureur libre)

8.2 eat out (phr v) /i:t aʊt/
have a meal in a restaurant • *They like eating out at different restaurants.* ❖ prendre un repas à l'extérieur

8.3 darkness (n) /'dɑ:kənəs/
the state of having no light • *Suddenly, the lights went out and the house was in darkness.* > dark (adj, n), darken (v) ❖ obscurité

8.4 nightmare (n) /'naɪtmɛə(r)/
a bad dream that upsets you • *He had a nightmare about being in a terrible accident and was relieved that it was only a dream.* > nightmarish (adj) ❖ cauchemar

8.5 caver (n) /'keɪvə(r)/
sb who explores caves • *Cavers have to climb and swim in order to get to new caves which have never been explored.* > cave, caving (n) ❖ spéléologue

8.6 excitement (n) /ɪk'saɪtmənt/
the state of feeling excited • *It's a great experience to share the excitement of a live performance with friends.* > excite (v), exciting, excited (adj) ❖ excitation, enthousiasme

8.7 crawl (v) /krɔ:l/
move along the ground on your hands and knees • *The nine-month-old baby crawled to her mother.* > crawl (n) ❖ marcher à quatre pattes

8.8 narrow (adj) /'nærou/
measuring a small distance from one side to the other • *The street is narrow, so only one car can go along it at a time.* > narrowly (adv) ❖ étroit(e) 📖 Opp: wide

8.9 tunnel (n) /'tʌnl/
a long passage through rock • *The train entered a long tunnel to go through the mountain.* ❖ tunnel

8.10 contain (v) /kən'teɪn/
to have inside or as part of sth • *This box contains some very valuable jewellery. Look inside.* > container (n) ❖ contenir

8.11 feature (n) /'fi:tʃə(r)/
sth typical, important or interesting of a place or thing • *The house has some interesting features: a lovely kitchen, a fireplace in every room and a large attic.* ❖ caractéristique

8.12 formation (n) /fɔ:'meɪʃn/
a particular shape or pattern • *Experts can tell how old an area is from the rock formations in caves and cliffs.* ❖ formation

8.13 speleothem (n) /'spi:li:əθɛm/
rock shapes made by water dripping through rock in a cave • *We saw amazing speleothems shaped like castles in the caves.* ❖ spéléothème

8.14 structure (n) /'strʌktʃə(r)/
sth that has been built • *The Eiffel Tower is quite old now, but it's still a magnificent structure.* ❖ structure

8.15 rainwater (n) /'reɪnwɔ:tə(r)/
water that falls as rain • *During the storm, the streets flooded with rainwater.* ❖ eau de pluie

8.16 stone (n) /stəʊn/
a hard substance found in the ground • *The men threw stones at the lion to chase it away from their village.* > stony (adj) ❖ pierre

8.17 bat (n) /bæt/
a small animal that has wings and flies at night • *After sunset, the bats were flying around the trees in the square.* ❖ chauve-souris

8.18 spider (n) /'spɑɪdə(r)/
a small creature that has eight legs and makes a web to catch insects • *He watched the spider climbing up the wall.* ❖ araignée

8.19 caving (n) /'keɪvɪŋ/
the sport of going into underground caves • *Have you ever been caving?* > cave, caver (n) ❖ spéléologie

8.20 drinking water (n) /'drɪŋkɪŋ wɔ:tə(r)/
water that is suitable for drinking safely • *In some countries, many people get ill because there's no clean drinking water.* ❖ eau potable

- 8.21 risk** (n) /rɪsk/
danger • *Don't put yourself at risk by going sailing in dangerous weather conditions.*
➤ risk (v), risky (adj) ❖ risque
- 8.22 trapped** (adj) /træpt/
not able to get out of or away from sth • *The climbers got trapped in the snow when trying to get back down the mountain.* ➤ trap (n, v)
❖ piégé(e)
- 8.23 hypothermia** (n) /ˌhaɪpəˈθɜːmiə/
the state when your body gets so cold that it can't get warm again • *After falling into the cold lake, Daniel was suffering from hypothermia.* ❖ hypothermie
- 8.24 warm up** (phr v) /wɔːm ʌp/
to become warm after being cold • *I had a bowl of hot soup to warm up when I came home.* ❖ se réchauffer
- 8.25 expert** (n) /ˈɛkspɜːt/
sb who has a lot of knowledge about sth • *My cousin is an expert on rock formations and is studying geology at university.* ❖ expert(e)
- 8.26 explore** (v) /ɪkˈsplɔː(r)/
to go around a place to learn things about it
• *We parked the car and began to explore the forest.* ➤ explorer (n), exploration (n)
❖ explorer
- 8.27 footprint** (n) /ˈfʊtprɪnt/
a mark in the ground left by a foot or shoe
• *We left footprints in the snow when we walked across the garden.* ❖ Trace de pas
- 8.28 escape** (v) /ɪˈskeɪp/
get away from a place where you do not want to be • *How did the men escape from prison?*
➤ escape (n) ❖ s'enfuir, s'échapper
- 8.29 awful** (adj) /ˈɔːfl/
not nice; very bad • *That meal was awful! I'm not eating there again.* ❖ horrible
- 8.30 amazing** (adj) /əˈmeɪzɪŋ/
surprising; wonderful • *Your holiday photos are amazing. What a beautiful place.* ➤ amaze (v), amazed (adj) ❖ incroyable
- 8.31 torch** (n) /tɔːtʃ/
a small light that is held in the hand and is powered by batteries • *He turned on his torch to see in the darkness.* ❖ lampe-torche
- 8.32 pay back** (phr v) /peɪ bæk/
to give back money that you owe
• *My friend bought our tickets and I paid her back at the end of the month.* ❖ rembourser
- 8.33 permit** (v) /pəˈmɪt/
to allow • *Children under 15 are not permitted to enter the cave alone.* ❖ autoriser
- 8.34 hand** (v) /hænd/
to give sth to sb • *The woman in the ticket office handed me a map.* ❖ tendre

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- 8.35 backpacking** (n) /ˈbækpækɪŋ/
a journey in which you carry everything you need in a backpack • *They went backpacking in Cornwall and stayed at a couple of campsites.* ❖ randonnée avec sac à dos
- 8.36 drama** (n) /ˈdrɑːmə/
acting; plays • *Jane wants to study drama at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art.*
➤ dramatic (adj), dramatically (adv)
❖ art dramatique
- 8.37 graphic design** (n) /ˈgræfɪk dɪˈzaɪn/
putting text and images together for advertisements, magazines or books • *The book's success will depend on its attractive graphic design.* ❖ conception graphique
- 8.38 sculpture** (n) /ˈskʌlptʃə(r)/
making works of art out of stone, wood, metal, etc; an object made out of stone, wood, clay, etc. • *There are many examples of ancient sculpture in museums in Greece.* ➤ sculpt (v), sculptor (n) ❖ sculpture
- 8.39 squash** (n) /skwɒʃ/
an indoor sports game in which players hit a ball against a wall • *Tanya plays squash at the sport centre after work to keep fit.* ❖ squash
- 8.40 gallery** (n) /ˈgæləri/
a building in which the public can see works of art • *There is a great exhibition of modern sculpture at the art gallery.* ❖ galerie
- 8.41 leaflet** (n) /ˈliːflɪt/
a piece of paper or a few pages that advertise sth or give information about sth • *The local gym has handed out these leaflets which give details of prices and special offers.*
❖ dépliant
- 8.42 face to face** (phr) /feɪs tə feɪs/
very close to sb/sth so you can look at them
• *I prefer to have lessons face to face in a classroom rather than doing them online.*
❖ face-à-face
- 8.43 adore** (v) /əˈdɔː(r)/
to like sth very much • *I adore dancing and I want to be a ballet dancer.* ❖ adorer
- 8.44 can't stand** (phr) /kɑːnt stænd/
to dislike sb/sth very much • *Vasso can't stand the smell of garlic. It makes her feel sick.*
❖ détester, ne pas supporter
- 8.45 record** (v) /rɪˈkɔːd/
to write down information or store sounds or video in a computer so that it can be seen or heard in the future • *The band are recording their new song in the studio now.* ➤ record (n)
❖ enregistrer

- 8.46** **podcast** (n) /'pɒdkɑːst/
an audio file from the internet that you can play on a computer, smartphone, or other device
• *Our French teacher sometimes downloads podcasts from French radio stations for us to listen to in class.* ❖ podcast
- 8.47** **video clip** (n) /'vɪdiəʊ klɪp/
a short film or part of a film recorded on the internet • *We've made a video clip to go online with the band's new song.* ❖ clip vidéo
- 8.48** **perform** (v) /pə'fɔːm/
to act, sing, play an instrument, etc. to entertain people • *The singer performed a few songs for the audience.* > performer, performance (n) ❖ interpréter
- 8.49** **photograph** (v) /'fəʊtəgrɑːf/
to take a photo of sb/sth • *Ian managed to photograph the birds in their nest across the lake.* > photograph, photography, photographer (n), photographic (adj)
❖ photographeur
- 8.50** **ballet** (n) /'bæleɪ/
dancing that tells a story with music • *I love watching ballet. The dancers are so graceful.*
❖ ballet
- 8.51** **poetry** (n) /'pəʊətri/
a kind of writing, arranged in lines, often with rhyming words at the end • *Shakespeare wrote poetry as well as plays.* > poet, poem (n), poetic (adj) ❖ poésie
