a large pink bird with long thin legs and a long neck which lives near water • *She took an impressive photo of a pair of flamingoes in their nest at the side of the lake.*

- 11.2 rescue** (v) /'reskjʊ:
to save sb/sth from a dangerous situation
• *The diver rescued the turtle which was trapped in a fishing net.* ❖ rescue, rescuer (n)

- 11.3 information technology** (n) /,ɪnfə'meɪʃən tek'nɒlədʒi/
the study of electronic devices, especially computers, and how to use them
• *Developments in information technology have made international communications much faster.* ❖ technologie de l'information

- 11.4 wild-camping** (n) /,waɪld'kæmpɪŋ/
camping in nature, not on an organised campsite • *Liz went away for a weekend of wild-camping on a beach with some friends.*

the study of computers and how to use them
• *Do you enjoy your lessons in computer studies at school?* ❖ études en informatique

an amount of bread baked in one particular shape • *They took a loaf of bread and some cheese for their picnic.* ❖ miche (de pain)

- 11.7 tutor** (n) /'tju:tə(r)/
a teacher • *A tutor gives me English lessons at home twice a week.* > tutor (v) ❖ tuteur, tutrice
- 11.8 virtual** (adj) /'vɜ:ʃʊəl/
made to seem real • *We don't have a garden but we enjoy playing virtual sports on a games console.* > virtually (adv) ❖ virtuel(le)

- 11.9 Renaissance** (adj) /rɪ'neɪsɪns/
from the period from the fourteenth to sixteenth centuries when artists and writers used ideas from ancient Greece and Rome in their work
• *I visited Rome and saw some amazing painting from the Renaissance period.*
> Renaissance (n) ❖ Renaissance
- 11.10 novel** (n) /'nɒvl/
a long story in a book • *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer is my favourite novel.*
> novelist (n) ❖ roman
- 11.11 workout** (n) /'wɜ:kəʊt/
physical exercise • *She did a one-hour workout at the gym.* > work out (phr v)
❖ entraînement
- 11.12 encouragement** (n) /ɪn'kʌrɪdʒmənt/
support • *With encouragement from her coach, Sylvia won the tennis match.*
> encourage (v), encouraging (adj)
❖ encouragement
- 11.13 crafty** (adj) /krɑ:fti/
clever without being honest • *That crafty salesperson made me pay 20 pounds extra.*
> craftiness (n) ❖ rusé(e)
- 11.14 creation** (n) /kri'eɪʃn/
sth that has been made • *This statue is one of Michelangelo's greatest creations.*
> create (v), creative (adj) ❖ création
- 11.15 jewellery** (n) /'dʒu:əlri/
ornaments you wear like earrings, rings, necklaces, etc. • *She wore a lot of gold jewellery to show she was rich.* ❖ bijoux
- 11.16 workshop** (n) /'wɜ:kʃɒp/
a class where learners do sth practical or have a group discussion on a particular subject
• *The teaching course included small workshops for students to discuss their experiences.* ❖ atelier
- 11.17 stuff** (n) /stʌf/
used to refer to a material or things when you do not know the name or the name is not important • *No way! I won't eat this stuff!*
❖ chose, truc
- 11.18 twig** (n) /twɪɡ/
a very small, thin branch of a tree • *They collected a few dry twigs to start their campfire.*
❖ brindille

- 11.19 shelter** (n) /'ʃeltə(r)/
a place where people or animals are safe
● *The climbers waited in the shelter until the storm had passed.* > shelter (v) ❖ abri
- 11.20 survival** (n) /sə'vaɪvl/
continuing to live in spite of danger ● *Their chance of survival in this terrible weather is not good.* > survive (v), survivor (n), survival (adj)
❖ survive
- 11.21 media** (n, n pl) /'mi:diə/
the ways that we receive news and entertainment, e.g. newspapers, TV, radio, internet ● *The accident was reported in the media.* ❖ média 📖 The singular form can be *medium* or *media*.
- 11.22 production** (n) /prə'dʌkʃn/
producing goods ● *China is famous for the production of electronic devices.* > produce (v), producer, product (n), productive (adj)
❖ production
- 11.23 animation** (n) /æni'meɪʃn/
making films and computer games that show pictures, models, etc. that seem to be moving
● *Nowadays, they use computer animation to make films.* > animate (v), animator (n)
❖ animation
- 11.24 feedback** (n) /'fi:dbæk/
comments or information about how good or useful sth is ● *So far, we've had positive feedback from our teacher.* ❖ commentaires
- 11.25 street dance** (n) /'stri:t ,dɑ:ns/
an energetic style of dancing by one or more dancers that was first done outside ● *In the city centre, we often see young people doing street dances to hip hop music.* ❖ street dance (danse de rue)
- 11.26 tango** (n) /'tæŋgəʊ/
a type of South American dance for two people
● *Our dance teacher taught us to do the tango and other Latin dances.* > tango (v) ❖ tango
- 11.27 muscle** (n) /mʌsl/
a part of the body that holds bones together and makes them move ● *Footballers often get leg injuries and pull muscles during a match.* > muscular (adj) ❖ muscle
- 11.28 branch** (n) /brɑ:ntʃ/
part of a tree ● *How many olives are growing on that branch?* ❖ branche
- 11.29 thought** (n) /θɔ:t/
an idea or opinion ● *What are your thoughts on going camping?* > think (v), thoughtful, thoughtless (adj) ❖ réflexion
- 11.30 wheelchair** (n) /'wi:lʃeə(r)/
a chair with wheels which helps sb who cannot walk to move around ● *Her brother was injured in a road accident and now uses a wheelchair to move around.* ❖ chaise/fauteuil roulant(e)

- 11.31 economics** (n) /,i:kə'nɒmɪks/
the study of how people spend their money and buy or sell things ● *My sister's studying economics at college.* > economy, economist (n), economic (adj) ❖ économie
- 11.32 essay** (n) /'eseɪ/
a piece of writing by a student as part of course work ● *I wrote an essay about the environmental problems of my country.*
❖ dissertation
- 11.33 degree** (n) /di'grɪ:/
a qualification from a university ● *Sandra is studying for a maths degree at the University of Birmingham.* ❖ diplôme universitaire
- 11.34 diploma** (n) /di'plɒmə/
an official document that says sb has passed an exam and has certain qualifications
● *I attended dance coaching classes and, at the end of the year, was given a diploma as a dance teacher.* ❖ diplôme
- 11.35 certificate** (n) /sə'tɪfɪkət/
a piece of paper which says you have finished a course ● *My brother got his First for Schools certificate from Cambridge, which proves that his English is very good.* > certify (v)
❖ certificat
- 11.36 fees** (n pl) /fi:z/
an amount of money you pay for a professional service, e.g. a course ● *Maria doesn't go to a language school because her parents can't afford the fees.* ❖ frais
- 11.37 grant** (n) /grɑ:nt/
money you get from the government to study
● *James paid for his university education with a student grant.* ❖ subvention, bourse
- 11.38 deposit** (n) /di'pɒzɪt/
an amount of money that is given as a first payment of a bigger sum ● *Ibrahim paid a deposit of £1,000 for his new car and he'll make the other payments monthly through the bank.* > deposit (v) ❖ acompte
- 11.39 study** (n) /'stʌdi/
research that examines a subject in detail
● *A number of studies have shown that eating fish is good for you.* > study (v) ❖ étude
- 11.40 intermediate** (adj) /,ɪntə'mi:diət/
having medium level skills between basic and advanced ● *I've done my beginner's course in French and I'm moving on to the intermediate class.* ❖ intermédiaire
- 11.41 advanced** (adj) /əd'vɑ:nst/
at a high level, well above basic ● *That book will be challenging to read if you're below advanced level.* > advance (v, n), advancement (n) ❖ avancé(e)

- 11.42 handwriting** (n) /'hændraɪtɪŋ/
writing done by hand with a pen or pencil, not typed • *I couldn't read my teacher's comments on my essay because of her untidy handwriting.* > hand-written (adj)
❖ écriture manuelle
- 11.43 biology** (n) /baɪ'ɒlədʒi/
the study of living things • *We learnt about how plants grow in biology today.* > biologist (n), biological (adj) ❖ biologie
- 11.44 make an effort** (phr) /meɪk ən 'efət/
try • *If you want to learn another language, you will have to make an effort and study a lot.*
❖ faire un effort
- 11.45 primary school** (n) /'praɪməri sku:l/
a school for children between the ages of five and eleven • *Most children enjoy going to primary school.* ❖ école primaire
- 11.46 secondary school** (n) /'sekəndri sku:l/
a school for children aged 11 to 18 • *In England, you start secondary school at the age of 11 and you can leave at 16 or 18.*
❖ école secondaire
- 11.47 manage** (v) /'mænɪdʒ/
to succeed in doing sth • *Did you manage to finish all your work on time?* > manager, management (n) ❖ gérer
- 11.48 oral** (adj) /'ɔːrəl/
spoken • *I have an English oral exam on Monday.* > orally (adv) ❖ oral(e)
- 11.49 examiner** (n) /ɪg'zæmɪnə(r)/
sb who tests people on sth and marks exams • *The examiner was strict and didn't give anybody an A for their composition.* > examine (v), exam, examination (n) ❖ examinateur, examinatrice
- 11.50 candidate** (n) /'kændɪdeɪt/
sb who takes an exam • *The candidates sat in silence before they were allowed to look at the exam paper.* ❖ candidat(e)
- 11.51 matter** (v) /'mætə(r)/
to be important • *It doesn't matter if you don't win the race – just do your best.* ❖ importer
- 11.52 accent** (n) /'æksənt/
the way you pronounce words, depending on where you are from • *My friend has a Canadian accent, but she is easy to understand.* ❖ accent
- 11.53 pronunciation** (n) /prə'nʌnsɪ'eɪʃn/
the correct way a word is said
• *The pronunciation of the French letter 'r' is difficult for English speakers.* > pronounce (v)
❖ prononciation

- 11.54 exhibit** (v) /ɪg'zɪbɪt/
to show sth in a public place so that people can go to see it • *A famous art gallery is going to exhibit her paintings.* > exhibit, exhibition (n) ❖ exposer
- 11.55 staff** (n) /stɑːf/
people who work at the same place • *There are five members of staff at this private language school: four teachers and one secretary.* ❖ personnel 📖 Syn: personnel
- 11.56 first aid** (n) /fɜːst eɪd/
first medical help given to sb who is hurt • *It is important to know first aid when you work with children at a summer camp so you can help them quickly if they hurt themselves.*
❖ premiers secours
- 11.57 type** (v) /taɪp/
to write using a keyboard • *Type your details into the online application form.* > type, typing, typist (n) ❖ taper (sur un clavier)
- 11.58 dye** (v) /daɪ/
to change the colour of sth • *Jane used a new dye for her hair and it's a lovely red colour now.* > dye (n) ❖ teindre

• *I convinced my parents that I was telling the truth.* > conviction (n) ❖ convaincre
- 11.71 that's a good point** (phr) /ðæt ə ɡʊd pɔɪnt/
your idea is a good one • *'If we leave later, we'll miss the bus.'* 'That's a good point. OK. We'll leave now.' ❖ il s'agit d'un point important
