a plant with small purple flowers that smell nice
• *She uses lavender from the garden to keep the clothes in her wardrobe smelling nice.*

- 1.8 pure** (adj) /pjʊə(r)/
with nothing extra added • *This scarf is made from pure wool.* > purity (n) ❖ pur(e)
- 1.9 contrast** (v) /'kɒntrɑːst/
to have a clear difference from sth else
• *Living in our quiet village contrasts with life in the centre of London.* > contrast (n)
❖ contraster

- 1.10 frame** (n) /freɪm/
a strong structure that goes around sth, e.g. a door, window, picture, to hold it in position
• *The house has old wooden window frames which need painting.* > frame (v) ❖ cadre, encadrement
- 1.11 display** (n) /dɪ'spleɪ/
a show of sth happening • *We sat on the balcony and watched the fireworks display in the distance.* > display (v) ❖ spectacle
- 1.12 aurora borealis** (n) /ə,'rɔːrə ,bɔːrɪ'eɪlɪs/
coloured light that appears sometimes in the sky in the most northern countries • *On our visit to northern Scotland, we stayed awake all night to watch the colourful aurora borealis in the sky.* ❖ aurore boréale ☞ Syn: the Northern Lights
- 1.13 impact** (n) /'ɪmpækt/
a strong effect or reaction • *Not eating properly when you are young can have an impact on your health when you get older.*
❖ impact, incidence
- 1.14 remind** (v) /rɪ'maɪnd/
to cause you to remember sth you had forgotten • *This painting reminds me of my grandparents' house.* > reminder (n)
❖ rappeler
- 1.15 cultural** (adj) /'kʌltʃərəl/
relating to the culture of one country, group, etc. • *Since tourism has increased on the island, there have been cultural changes in the local lifestyle.* > culture (n), culturally (adv)
❖ culturel(le)
- 1.16 background** (n) /'bækgraʊnd/
a person's family and past experience of education, work, and living conditions
• *The writer came from a poor background, but managed to become successful.*
❖ contexte
- 1.17 look** (n) /'lʊk/
an act of looking at sb/sth in order to find sth out • *Have another good look at your homework before you hand it in.* ❖ observation
- 1.18 primary colour** (n) /,praɪməri 'kʌlə(r)/
one of the three main colours: red, blue or yellow • *When you mix the primary colours, blue and yellow, you get green.* ❖ couleur primaire
- 1.19 sunshine** (n) /'sʌnʃaɪn/
the heat and light from the sun • *These plants will grow better if they get more sunshine.*
❖ (rayons du) soleil

- 1.20 eye-catching** (adj) /'aɪ kætʃɪŋ/
which can attract attention because it looks bright, special or different in some way • *He wore an eye-catching bright green shirt.*
❖ attrayant(e), accrocheur/accrocheuse
- 1.21 energetic** (adj) /ˌenə'dʒetɪk/
lively and with a lot of energy • *I'm not going to the gym today as I don't feel very energetic.* > energy (n), energetically (adv)
❖ énergique
- 1.22 enthusiastic** (adj) /ɪnθju:zi'æstɪk/
excited and very interested about sth • *She was really enthusiastic about her trip to Peru.*
> enthusiasm (n), enthusiastically (adv)
❖ enthousiaste
- 1.23 sunflower** (n) /'sʌnflaʊə(r)/
a tall plant with yellow flowers whose seeds can be eaten or made into oil for cooking
• *I love this painting of bright yellow sunflowers growing in a field.* ❖ tournesol
- 1.24 beauty** (n) /'bjʊ:ti/
the quality of being beautiful • *His painting showed the beauty of the countryside.*
> beautiful (adj) ❖ beauté
- 1.25 caution** (v) /'kɔ:ʃn/
to tell someone about a danger or problem that they need to avoid • *The police put up signs to caution drivers about the floods.* > caution (n)
❖ avertir
- 1.26 warn** (v) /wɔ:n/
to tell someone about a danger or problem that they need to avoid • *Her parents warned her not to walk home alone at night.* > warning (n)
❖ prévenir
- 1.27 on board** (expr) /ɒn bɔ:d/
in or on a vehicle, e.g. ship, train, plane
• *The pilot waited on board the plane to welcome the passengers.* ❖ à bord
📖 Syn: aboard
- 1.28 calm** (adj) /kɑ:m/
not in a panic; not very excited • *'Please don't panic and keep calm,' said the flight attendant to the passengers.* ❖ calme
- 1.29 represent** (v) /reprɪ'zent/
to symbolise • *Red represents anger in some cultures.* > representation (n)
❖ représenter
- 1.30 confidence** (n) /'kɒnfɪdəns/
a belief in your ability to do sth successfully
• *To be a successful athlete, you must have confidence in your abilities.* > confident (adj), confidently (adv) ❖ confiance
- 1.31 seriousness** (n) /'sɪəriəsənəs/
the state of being serious • *The news report showed the seriousness of the terrible storm.*
> serious (adj), seriously (adv) ❖ sérieux
- 1.32 suggest** (v) /sə'dʒest/
to give sb an idea indirectly • *Wearing dark colours can suggest the idea of sadness.*
> suggestion (n) ❖ suggérer
- 1.33 trust** (v) /trʌst/
to believe that sb is good, honest, capable, etc. • *Of course I trust Julie. She's my best friend.* > trust (n), trustworthy, trusting (adj)
❖ faire confiance
- 1.34 stranger** (n) /'streɪndʒə(r)/
sb that you do not know • *My dad always told me not to accept anything from strangers.*
> strange (adj), strangely (adv) ❖ étranger, étrangère
- 1.35 feel blue** (expr) /fi:l blu:/
to feel sad • *It had been raining all day, which made him feel blue as he couldn't go out.*
❖ avoir le cafard
- 1.36 depressed** (adj) /dɪ'prest/
very unhappy • *I felt depressed after the film because it had a sad ending.* > depress (v), depression (n), depressing (adj)
❖ déprimé(e)
- 1.37 reduce** (v) /rɪ'dju:s/
to make less or smaller • *I am trying to reduce the amount of sugar I eat every day.*
> reduction (n) ❖ diminuer
- 1.38 hunger** (n) /'hʌŋgə(r)/
the feeling that you need to eat • *He ate some fruit to stop the feeling of hunger on his journey.* > hungry (adj), hungrily (adv) ❖ faim
- 1.39 rarely** (adv) /'reəli/
not often, seldom • *We rarely go to restaurants because they can be expensive.* > rare (adj)
❖ rarement
- 1.40 loss** (n) /lɒs/
no longer having sth • *Renata was sad at the loss of her new mobile phone.* > lose (v), lost (adj) ❖ perte
- 1.41 advise** (v) /əd'vaɪz/
to tell sb what might be the best thing to do
• *The doctor advised me to eat more fresh fruit.* > advice (n) ❖ conseiller
- 1.42 trick** (v) /trɪk/
to make sb believe sth that is not true, usually to make them do sth • *The salesperson tricked Tim into buying the old car by saying it was in perfect condition.* > trick (n) ❖ piéger
- 1.43 nervous** (adj) /'nɜ:vəs/
anxious about sth • *He's nervous about giving a speech in front of the class.* > nervously (adv), nervousness, nerve (n) ❖ nerveux, nerveuse
- 1.44 aggressive** (adj) /ə'ɡresɪv/
angry and ready to attack • *This dog is aggressive, so don't go near it or it might hurt you.* > aggression (n) ❖ agressif, aggressive

- 1.45 flag** (n) /flæg/
a piece of cloth that has a specific pattern and colours to represent a country or as a signal
• *The ship had a blue and white flag to show that it was Greek.* ❖ drapeau
- 1.46 immediately** (adv) /ɪ'mi:diətli/
straight away, without waiting • *When she saw the accident, she immediately called the police.* > immediate (adj) ❖ immédiatement
- 1.47 possibility** (n) /,pɒsə'bɪləti/
a chance that sth might happen • *There's a possibility of rain tonight, but it's not for sure.* > possible (adj), possibly (adv) ❖ possibilité
- 1.48 aware** (adj) /ə'weə(r)/
if you are aware of sth, you notice it or you know it exists • *Are you aware of the fact that films can cost millions of dollars to make?* > awareness (n) ❖ conscient(e)

to seem • *From the sound of her voice, she appeared to be worried.* > appearance (n)

- 1.51 famously** (adv) /'feɪməsli/

into the future; in front • *The snow was so heavy that he couldn't see the road ahead.* ❖ devant
- 1.53 obvious** (adj) /'ɒbvɪəs/
clear to see or understand • *It was obvious that we were going in the wrong direction, so we turned back.* > obviously (adv)

- 1.54 avoid** (v) /ə'vɔɪd/
to keep away from • *They went to the city by metro to avoid the busy roads.* > avoidance (n) ❖ éviter

to tell sb about a danger • *The police stopped the cars to alert drivers to the danger of floods ahead.* > alert (adj), alertness (n)

to express happiness to sb for their success at sth • *I congratulated Maria on passing her driving test.* > congratulations (n pl) ❖ féliciter

existing or happening first • *The original owners of our house were a family who moved to Australia.* > originality (n) ❖ initial(e)
