Scenery vs landscape

The **landscape** is everything you see when you look at a wide area, including natural and manmade features. **Scenery** refers to natural features and can refer to a wide area or to a smaller area. **Scenery** is usually used to describe attractive places while **landscape** can be used regardless of whether the area is attractive or not.
We looked out over the mountainous / industrial / desert landscape.
Many tourists drive through the forest to admire the beautiful scenery.
