the line around the middle of the Earth • *He comes from an island in Indonesia, close to the equator.* ❖ równik

- 2.41 wax** (n) /wæks/
the substance used to make candles

- 2.42 plug** (v) /plʌg/
fill a hole with suitable material • *He tried plugging the hole with newspaper to stop the leak.* > plug (n) ❖ zatykać

use a weapon to shoot • *He fired his gun into the air as a warning.* ❖ strzelać
