- 10.5 kindergarten (n) /'kındə,gɑːtən/ a school for children aged between two and five ● The children are in a full-day kindergarten. We pick them up at five.

- principle (n) /'prinsəpl/ a basic idea or rule that influences your actions
 Lying is against my principles – I always tell the truth. * zasada
- 10.7 sustainability (n) /sə,steɪnə'bɪləti/ the quality of causing as little damage as possible to the environment so that it can continue to exist for a long time ● One way to achieve sustainability is to develop renewable energy. > sustainable (adj) \$ zrównoważony rozwój
- 10.8 individuality (n) /,IndIvId3u'æləti/ the qualities that make a person different from the others ● People should be free to express their individuality, but they should also be able to work together as members of society.
 > individual (n, adj) ◆ indywidualność
- unique (adj) /juː'niːk/
 being the only one of its kind or special and unusual in some way *It's a unique situation. I've never experienced anything like it.* > uniqueness (n) ◆ wyjątkowy

- **10.10** worm (n) /w3:m/ a small animal with a long, thin, soft body that has no bones, legs or arms • *I can't eat this apple. There's a worm in it!* ***** robak
- 10.11 compost (n) /'kompost/ a mixture of dead plants, food, etc. that you add to soil to help plants grow ● We make compost out of all kinds of waste.
 ♦ kompost
- 10.12 rodent (n) /'rəʊdnt/ a type of small animal with sharp front teeth, such as a mouse or a rat ● Cats often chase birds and rodents. ◆ gryzoń
- **10.13 owl** (n) /aʊl/ a bird with large round eyes that hunts small animals at night ● *Owls are considered a symbol* of wisdom in many cultures. ♦ sowa
- 10.14 keep (sth) down (phr v) /ki:p ('s∧mθin) daon/ control the size or number of sth so that it does not increase ● The company needs to keep its prices down as there is a lot of competition.

- 10.16 consciously (adv) /'kon∫əsli/ in a way that shows you are aware of what is happening and what effects it has • I don't think he realises he's rude. He doesn't do it consciously. ➤ conscious (adj) � świadomie

- 10.17 commitment (n) /kəˈmɪtmənt/ the willingness to work hard and give a lot of time and energy to sth ● She demonstrated a commitment to the fight for human rights throughout her life. > commit (v), committed (adj) ◆ zaangażowanie
- 10.19 founder (n) /'faʊndə(r)/ the person that starts an organisation or institution ● Jeff Bezos is the founder of Amazon, one of the five largest technology companies. > found (v) ◆ założyciel

- 10.21 numeracy (n) /'nju:mərəsi/ the ability to do basic mathematics • It's easy to do the calculations if you have basic numeracy skills. * liczenie
- 10.22 literacy (n) /'Iɪtərəsi/ the ability to read and write ● Literacy rates continue to be rather low in some developing countries. > literate (adj) ◆ umiejętność czytania i pisania
- 10.23 algebra (n) /'ældʒəbrə/ the part of mathematics that uses symbols and letters ● *In algebra, the sign x usually represents an unknown number.* ❖ algebra

- 10.26 (it's) a matter of time (expr) /(Its) ə 'mætər əv taIm/ it will definitely happen, sooner or later ● *It's* only a matter of time before we learn the whole truth.
- 10.28 integrate (v) /'IntIgreIt/ combine two or more things into one ● The kindergarten teacher always tried to integrate learning with play. >> integration (n)
