#### 6.4 foyer (n) /'fɔIeI/ the entrance area of a hotel, cinema, etc. After we unpack in our rooms, we can meet downstairs in the foyer and decide where to have a meal. ♦ hall Syn: lobby

- 6.5 **lobby** (n) /'lobi/ the entrance area of a building ● *As we entered the hotel, the manager greeted us in the lobby.* ◆ hall, vestibule Syn: foyer
- 6.6 motel (n) /məʊ'tel/ a hotel for drivers and their passengers that has parking spaces near the rooms ● He stopped for the night at a roadside motel.

- 6.7 overcrowded (adj) /,əʊvə'kraʊdɪd/ which has too many people ● *In the poor areas* of the city, people live in small overcrowded buildings. ◆ surpeuplé(e)
- 6.8 suite (n) /swirt/ a set of rooms booked as one unit in a hotel
  They booked a family suite with two bedrooms on the top floor of the hotel.

- 6.9 twin room (n) /,twin 'ru:m/ a hotel room with two single beds ● My friend and I booked a twin room to share as there were no single rooms available.

- 6.10 upmarket (adj) /,∧p'mɑːkɪt/ high-class and usually expensive • The international conference took place at a well-known upmarket hotel in the city centre.

6.11 villa (n) /ˈvɪlə/

a house, often by the sea or in a rural area, where people can stay for a holiday ● *He owns a holiday villa overlooking the beach.* ◆ villa

- 6.18 fortunes (n pl) /'fɔːtʃuːnz/ the circumstances and chances of succeeding that affect sb/sth • *The island's fortunes are dependent on tourism.* ≻ fortunate (adj), fortunately (adv) � bonne fortune
- 6.19 resettle (v) /,riː'setl/ to move or help others to move from their homes to live in another place ● Realising the volcano would destroy their town, they left their homes and resettled on another island.
   > resettlement (n) ◆ réinstaller

- 6.20 lodge (n) /lbdʒ/ a small house where people stay for a holiday, especially to take part in an outdoor activity
  The wooden holiday lodges were situated near the lake. ≻ lodge (v) ❖ lodge
- **6.21 resort** (n) /rr'zɔ:t/ a place which provides facilities for many people to stay on holiday ● *The mountain village is a popular winter resort, attracting skiers and snowboarders.* ◆ complexe touristique
- 6.22 homestay (n) /'həʊmsteɪ/ a paid holiday stay in a host's family home
  The cost of our trip to Nepal included a homestay with our mountain guide's family.

- 6.28 mining (n) /'maɪnɪŋ/ the industry that involves taking coal or metals from under the ground ● *Thousands of people* once travelled across North America to make their fortune from gold mining. ❖ extraction, exploitation minière

   wood that can be used for building or making things The natural forest was replaced with pine trees grown for timber. ◆ bois de charpente

6.30 ecotourism (n) /'iːkəʊtʊərɪzəm/ holidays designed to avoid damaging the environment or to participate in protecting it
Travel agents now offer ecotourism options for holidaymakers who want to experience the natural environment. ➤ ecotourist (n)

- 6.48 rate (n) /reɪt/ a level of payment ● They hired a car from the company that offered the most economical rates. ♦ taux
