**6.2 watersports** (n pl) /'wɔːtəspɔːts/ - vodní sporty

sports that are done on or in water • *I love all watersports, especially water-skiing and diving.* ❖

located or done inside a building • *In winter, we go swimming at an indoor swimming pool.* ➤ indoors (adv) ❖ 📖

a sport where you lie on a surfboard and use your arms or stand up and use a paddle to move forward • *Paddleboarding was fun, but I kept slipping off the board into the water.* ❖

**6.6 combination** (n) /kɒmbɪ'neɪʃn/ - kombinace

a mixture • *Surfing needs a combination of balance and strength.* ➤ combine (v) ❖

**6.7 surfing** (n) /'sɜːfɪŋ/ - surfování  
a sport where you stand on a board and ride on waves • *Surfing is popular in places like Hawaii, where the waves are huge.* ➤ surf (v), surfer (n) ❖

**6.8 rowing** (n) /'rəʊɪŋ/ - veslování  
a sport or activity of travelling in a boat using oars • *Rowing is great exercise,*

*especially for your arms.* ➤ row (v), rower (n) ❖

**6.9 lie** (v) /laɪ/ - ležet

to be in a position in which your body is flat on a surface • *The surfer was lying on the board, and when a big wave came, he stood up and rode it.* ❖

**6.10 kneel** (v) /niːl/ - klečat

to move into a position with your knees on the ground to support your body • *He knelt down beside a tree to take a photo of a bird's nest.* ❖

**6.11 paddle** (n) /'pædl/ - pádlo

a pole with a flat part at the end, used to push water to make a small boat move • *The motorboat's engine stopped so we used the paddles to row back to the shore.* ❖

**6.12 board** (n) /bɔːd/ - prkno

a long thin piece of hard material used in sports like surfing • *This board is used for surfing and it is made of expensive material.* ❖

**6.13 challenge** (n) /'tʃæləndʒ/ - výzva  
sth difficult that tests your ability • *Sailing across the Atlantic alone was an amazing challenge.* ➤ challenge (v), challenging (adj) ❖

**6.14 scuba diving** (n) /'skuːbə 'daɪvɪŋ/ - potápění s přístrojem

swimming underwater using a container of air that you have on your back and a tube that you use to breathe the air in the container • *My greatest ambition is to go scuba diving in the Great Barrier Reef and see the corals, fish and other sea life there.* ❖

**6.15 level** (n) /'levl/ - úroveň

a particular standard; how much you know about a subject; how good you are at an activity • *I've been studying English for five years and my level is quite good.* ➤ level (adj) ❖

**6.16 including** (prep) /ɪn'kluːdɪŋ/ - včetně  
having sth as part of a larger group or amount • *The child ate everything on her plate, including the spinach.* ➤ include (v)

**6.17 instructor** (n) /ɪn'straktə/ - instruktor; trenér

a trainer; sb who teaches you a sport •

*Dan is a swimming instructor and gives lessons to children every evening at the local pool.* ➤ instruct (v), instruction (n)

**6.18 be in safe hands** (phr) /bi: ɪn seɪf hændz/ - být v dobrých rukou

to not be in danger • *You are in safe hands because the instructor has been giving skiing lessons for 20 years.* ❖

**6.19 hire** (v) /haɪə(r)/ - (pro)najmout si to rent for a short time • *You don't have to buy a boat when you go on holiday. You can hire one for as long as you want.* ❖

**6.20 equipment** (n) /i'kwɪpmənt/ - vybavení; výstroj

things that are needed for an activity • *The equipment for sports like scuba diving is very expensive.* ➤ equip (v), equipped (adj) ❖

**6.21 belt** (n) /belt/ - pásek

a long narrow piece of leather or cloth that you wear around your waist • *He's good at judo; he has a black belt.* ❖

**6.22 qualified** (adj) /'kwɒlɪfaɪd/ - kvalifikovaný

having the correct training and/or experience to do a job • *Carmen took a course to become a qualified sailing instructor.* ➤ qualify (v), qualification (n)

**6.23 enter a competition** (phr) /'entə ə ,kɒmpə'tɪʃn/ - přihlásit se do soutěže

to put your name on the list for a competition • *Are you going to enter the story-writing competition? You might win it.* ❖

**6.24 enjoyment** (n) /ɪn'dʒɔɪmənt/ - radost; potěšení

the feeling of pleasure from doing sth you enjoy • *She gets a lot of enjoyment from walking in the countryside.* ➤ enjoy (v), enjoyable (adj) ❖

**6.25 helmet** (n) /'helmit/ - přilba

a hard hat that protects your head • *In Formula 1 racing, the drivers wear helmets to protect their heads.* ❖

**6.26 coordination** (n) /kəʊˌɔːdɪˈneɪʃn/ - koordinace

the ability to control your movements well

• *An athlete needs to be fit and have excellent coordination.* ➤ coordinate (v) ❖

**6.27 ice-skating** (n) /'aɪs skeɪtɪŋ/ - bruslení

the sport of moving on ice, wearing special skates • *He fell on the ice and broke his arm the first time he went ice-skating.* ➤ ice-skate (v) ❖

**6.28 skate** (n) /skeɪt/ - brusle

a boot with a metal blade or wheels on the bottom • *I put on my skates and went round and round the ice rink.* ➤ skate (v), skater, skating (n) ❖

**6.29 ice rink** (n) /aɪs rɪŋk/ - zimní stadion

a specially prepared surface of ice where you can skate • *It is quite cold on the ice rink, so dress warmly.* ❖

**6.30 combine** (v) /kəm'baɪn/ - skloubit to have two or more different features

• *Erica combines family life and a career in architecture.* ➤ combination (n) ❖

**6.31 water-skiing** (n) /wɔːtə 'ski:ɪŋ/ - vodní lyžování

a sport in which you are pulled behind a fast boat on skis • *Water-skiing is a hard sport and many people fall in the water when they first try.* ➤ water-ski (v) ❖

**6.32 pull** (v) /pʊl/ - táhnout

to make sb/sth move towards you because they are attached to you or because you are holding them • *Our car broke down and it was pulled along by a truck.* ❖

**6.33 surfboard** (n) /'sɜːfbɔːd/ - surfovací prkno

a board used for surfing • *Get your surfboard and let's go to the beach. The waves are great for surfing today.* ➤ surfing, surfer (n), surf (v) ❖

**6.34 ride the waves** (phr) /raɪd ðə weɪvz/ - jezdit na vlnách

to move on the surface of the water on a board • *Professional surfers can ride the waves for great distances.* ❖ 📖 Syn: surf

**6.35 hold on tight** (phr) /həʊld ɒn taɪt/ - pevně se držet

to not let go, to hold firmly • *Here we go. Hold on tight so you don't fall into the sea!* ❖

**6.36 life jacket** (n) /laɪf 'dʒækɪt/ - záchranná vesta

a jacket filled with air that helps you float in water • *If you are in a boat, you should wear a life jacket in case you fall into the water.* ❖

**6.37 snowboarding** (n) /'snəʊbɔːdɪŋ/ - snowboarding

the sport of moving over snow on a board • *Snowboarding is a winter sport.*

➤ snowboard (n), snowboarder (n) ❖

**6.38 try sth out** (phr v) /traɪ 'sʌmθɪŋ aʊt/ - vyzkoušet něco

to do sth or use sth to find out if you like it • *Before you buy expensive equipment, you can try surfing out for a day at the watersports club.* ❖

**6.39 experienced** (adj) /ɪk'spiəriənst/ - zkušený

having skills or knowledge in a particular activity or job • *You should take her advice as she's very experienced and she knows how to do things properly.* ➤ experience (n, v) ❖ 📖 Opp: inexperienced

**6.40 athletic** (adj) /æθ'letɪk/ - fyzicky zdatný

physically strong and active • *Sara is a tall athletic girl who can do heavy work on a farm.* ➤ athlete (n), athletics (n) ❖

**6.41 shoot** (v) /ʃu:t/ - střílet

to kick or throw a ball to score a goal or point • *The player ran down the field, shot and scored.* ➤ shot (n) ❖

**6.42 helpful** (adj) /'helpfəl/ - užitečný sb who helps, sth that is useful • *Your tips on how to stay on the surfboard were really helpful.* ➤ help (v, n), helpfully (adv), helpfulness (n) ❖

**6.43 compete** (v) /kəm'pi:t/ - soutěžit; závodit

to take part in a competition or sport

• *Hundreds of athletes compete for a gold medal at the Olympic Games.*

**6.44 instruct** (v) /ɪn'strakt/ - učit; dát pokyny

to teach sb, especially a skill or process

• *The chemistry teacher instructed the students on how to do the experiment.*

**6.45 success** (n) /sʌk'ses/ - úspěch sth you do well • *She climbed up the ladder of success to become leader of her country.* ➤ succeed (v), successful (adj), successfully (adv) ❖

a person who has won a contest •

*Mohammed Ali was a world heavyweight boxing champion.* ➤ championship (n) ❖

sb who trains people to play a sport • *The rowing coach made his team train every day for an hour.* ➤ coach (v) ❖

**6.48 regularly** (adv) /'regjələli/ - pravidelně

often • *My grandparents visit us regularly. We see them once a month.* ➤ regular (adj) ❖

**6.49 occasionally** (adv) /ə'keɪznəli/ - příležitostně

sometimes • *We occasionally go camping at weekends, but only when the weather is good.* ➤ occasional (adj) ❖

**6.50 gymnastics** (n) /dʒɪm'næstɪks/ - gymnastika

a sport involving movements that need skill and strength • *She's very good at gymnastics and hopes to get into the Olympic team one day.* ➤ gymnast (n), gym (n) ❖

a sports event • *Did you see the football  
match between Arsenal and Liverpool on

**6.61 rider** (n) /'raɪdə(r)/ - jezdec

fell off his motorbike as he turned the  
corner.* > ride (v, n), riding (n) ❖

**6.62 point** (n) /pɔɪnt/ - bod  
a mark that counts on the score of a game  
or competition • *At the end of the word  
game, we counted our points to see who  
had the best score.* ❖

**6.63 run** (n) /rʌn/ - doběh  
a point scored in baseball or cricket by  
running from one place to another • *India  
scored 90 more runs and won the game.*
